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## Is call of duty on mobile

Customize your loadout and jump into a frantic match of Call of Duty. Earn killstreaks and dominate enemies while on your way to work, on your couch, or even in your bathroom with this title.Take the power, energy, and explosive nature of Call of Duty with you everywhere you go, in this iteration of the franchise for mobile devices. Call of Duty is an action-packed first-person-shooter that puts you in the boots of a soldier that’s armed to the teeth. In this iteration, there are multiple guns, characters, and maps that have been stuffed into one standalone package. There are mentions of updates that will include single-player and co-op but, for now, there’s a strong focus on multiplayer, and that’s made pretty clear with the presence of maps like Nuketown. That’s a place where team-based deathmatch has made a name for itself. The huge item variety is important because loadout customization is included. You’re able to tune your personalized choice of weapons and gadgets to take with you into each firefight. With this title, you also get to see a return of a plethora of game modes. This includes team deathmatch, domination, capture the flag, and hardpoint. With a decent connection, all of these feel right and make for some great fun. A big deal, however, is the inclusion of an entirely new way to play the game. Battle royale has been introduced to the franchise, and it plays well on mobile. Here, you join up to one hundred total players in a fight for survival. You can enter the struggle on your own, in a duo, or as an entire squad. What makes this title stand out is its inclusion of a large variety of vehicles in the chaos. You can jump into ATVs, helicopters, tactical water rafts, and 4x4s to traverse an expansive map in your quest for victory. There’s something to say about the customization present in this game. As you progress with every match, the game will track your stats and record your advancements. Every kill, victory, and achievement you earn unlocks new items. These include weapons, outfits, characters, and unique pieces of gear from the Call of Duty universe that can be included in your loadout. This is fantastic, to say the least. This keeps you engaged in every match, ever searching for the opportunity to improve and take steps closer to your next reward. The multiplayer finds another great way to keep you immersed. There’s a ranking system that also tracks your stats, and stamps your profile with your progression. Every step you take, bullet you fire, and death you suffer is included on a virtual scoreboard. All of these add up to produce a specific title for your account. This is put on display for everyone to see. Bragging rights have always been a part of the franchise, and it’s more present than ever here. This is made more clear with the inclusion of clans. This is a group you can form to play ranked clan matches with, and take on the challenge of climbing the leaderboards, unlocking items, and making new friends to play with. However, this system is a bit limited. There’s no online multiplayer hub to share with your clan, or special place to show off your achievements. This title runs pretty well on most devices. It does require a pretty powerful set of hardware, though, and this might be something that puts off a lot of players. However, the game presents you with a comfortable and easy to navigate interface. Running around in multiplayer is fairly simple and shooting up your foes feels decent. Also, although key bindings are absent for obvious reasons, there is a level of customization available for the way you want to play. If you can’t handle the default settings, there are certain tweaks you can make. You can steer away from the simple mode, which automatically fires at enemies when they pop into your crosshair, and try out the advanced mode. The latter gives you more control because you must manually fire your weapon as you navigate the battlefield. This traditional setup might feel more natural for veterans. However, it’s still very different from the classic mouse and keyboard setup, so it does feel a little awkward no matter what setting is selected. Where can you run this program? This game runs on most Android devices. The version isn’t as important as the strength of the device in question. It’s also available for iPhone. Is there a better alternative? No. This game gives you everything you need in a twitchy first-person-shooter. There are others that compare, like Bullet Force, but it doesn’t have the charm, visuals, and accuracy that this title provides.Call of Duty really shines in this iteration. It’s a small step onto the smaller screen, but it’s a leap into a new, and fun way to enjoy the franchise. Its highlight is the ability to take the action-packed gameplay with you anywhere in the world. As if that weren’t enough, you can even play with friends, and do so in competitive ranked matches. Call of Duty Mobile was an overnight sensation when it officially released last year, but not without some controversy. Certain features that players enjoyed during the beta period were removed before the game launched worldwide. The most controversial removal was Call of Duty Mobile controller support for both iOS and Android versions of the game.Fortunately, Activision heard player complaints and added the feature back in an update a few months after release. However, official support is limited to just a few controllers, and like in PUBG Mobile and Fortnite, using a controller will match you will other players using controllers to keep things fair:So which controllers does Call of Duty Mobile support and how do you connect them? Here’s everything you need to know! Does Call of Duty Mobile have full controller support?As of November 2019, Call of Duty Mobile has limited controller support on iOS and Android. Currently, only two controllers are officially supported, and they only work in-game. Navigating menus and loadout screens still has to be done with touch controls.Sensitivity for each game type (Multiplayer, Battle Royale, and Zombie) can be customized individually in settings, but button mappings cannot be adjusted for now. Developers have also committed to further optimizing Call of Duty Mobile controller support in the future.If you’re looking for fully customizable controls, you’ll have to play the game on an emulator like Bluestacks or the official Call of Duty Mobile emulator. Both of these are also supported but will match you with other emulator players. What controllers work with Call of Duty Mobile?The only officially supported Call of Duty Mobile controllers are DualShock 4 PlayStation 4 and Xbox One controllers. You may, however, run into issues with functionality. How to play Call of Duty Mobile with a controllerTo play COD Mobile with a PS4 or Xbox One controller, simply connect them via BlueTooth to your Android or iOS device. Learn more. Nthabeleng Lefu has an unbreakable bond with her patients. Here she is seen with Nozmanga Dikano Lejweleputswa District in Free State Province, South Africa, lies amid the famed goldfields, flanked by vast agricultural holdings producing maize and sunflowers that stretch from horizon to horizon. Like the rest of the country, the region is grappling with unemployment, poverty, and the devastating effects of the AIDS and TB epidemics. At the coalface – where all these factors intersect – is a group of health workers determined that no more lives should be needlessly lost and that rural patients receive excellent service. Health Systems Trust Nurse Clinician Nthabeleng Lefu embodies this approach: she has already made her mark, as is apparent when she enters the Phahameng Clinic. Patients waiting on benches hail her as an old friend or get up to shake her hand. Several patients are keen to share their stories of how ‘Sister Lefu’ helped them turn a corner when they felt there was no hope. In particular, she has been able to assist several patients who were on antiretroviral treatment (ART), but whose health did not seem to improve, despite sputum tests and X-rays for TB coming back negative. Nozmanga Dikano (36) is happy to see Sister Lefu arrive at the clinic, bounding across the waiting room to hug her and asking: “Do you see how fat I am now, Sister?” Dikano was diagnosed with HIV in 2001 and was treated with Bactrim to prevent opportunistic infections such as pneumocystis pneumonia (PCP). In 2007, she was also diagnosed with TB and started on ART. Nozmanga Dikano defaulted on treatment, a decision that almost cost her her life. “In 2010 I defaulted on treatment because I was working as a domestic in Bloemfontein [the provincial capital] and my boss wouldn’t let me go to the clinic to fetch my medicine. I’m sorry to say that I defaulted for 10 years until I had a baby in 2017. By the time they tested me in the antenatal screening, my CD4 count was at 111 – it is supposed to be at least 350. I already had three children and they are all HIV-negative, so they gave me Nevirapine to prevent me transmitting the virus to my baby during childbirth.” Dikano explains that after the birth she felt extremely weak and tired, unable to walk more than a few steps and struggling to even swallow water. “I thought it was because I had had a Caesarean section. I was admitted to the provincial hospital for three weeks for low blood pressure because the X-rays didn’t show TB. I told the doctor that I’d had TB before and recognized this feeling, but he ignored me and just changed my ARVs. I wasn’t getting better, so I discharged myself and came here to my local clinic to tell them what happened. The next day they sent Sister Nthabeleng to my house to fetch me; my face was swollen like a football and I was very dehydrated. My feet were icy cold and I couldn’t sleep at all. I thought ‘This is it. I am dying.’ She examined me and said she thought it was TB, even if it hadn’t shown up on the X-rays.” Dikano was placed on TB treatment and rapidly improved. “Within a week I was feeling much better. I have just one more month of treatment, and my baby is on INH (a TB preventative therapy drug) to prevent him contracting TB. When I came back for the first time in a few months, everyone here at the clinic was shocked at how much weight I had gained and how good I look now. Even MaSwanepoel [the Clinic Manager] couldn’t believe her eyes.” Dikano’s four children, ranging in age from infancy to 18 years old, were so thrilled to see their mother improve that they soon joined in ensuring that she adhered to treatment. “The children will come with my tablets on a tray with a glass of water and say ‘OK mama, it’s time for your medicine.’” Dikano says that stigma around TB is in some ways worse than the stigma of HIV. “I have been open about my HIV status for 20 years and because I always looked fine, no one was worried. But when I got really sick with TB, even my own siblings wouldn’t allow me to stay with them because they were afraid I would infect their children. They know it is highly contagious, and I think I looked so bad that it frightened them.” Now feeling as if she has a new lease on life, Dikano is a passionate advocate for education on TB and HIV: I speak to everyone who will listen about TB and HIV. I want to climb to the top of the mountain and tell the world that TB can be beaten.” Nozmanga Dikano is grateful to the Health Systems Trust nurses for nursing her back to life “I did a four-year nursing degree and then a postgraduate diploma in health care and another in healthcare management. I like working in primary health care context because there are so many poor and rural people in need of care who can’t afford private treatment. It is important to be humble when treating patients so we can have mutual respect. Even if a patient has a minor ailment, we must make sure that we treat it properly so that they feel safe and that someone is caring for them. South Africa ranks third-highest in the world in terms of TB burden, with an estimated incidence rate of 834 per 100 000 population in 2014 (about 400% increase over the last 15 years). Compared to HIV-negative people, HIV-positive people are 37 times more likely to contract TB, while about 62% of patients are coinfectd with HIV and TB. We must be creative to ensure the best outcomes for our patients. The most rewarding part of my job is watching patients with HIV and TB improving right in front of my eyes. Then I know that I’ve done my work properly.”





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
