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How to wash wool blanket

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Can they last a life if you care correctly for them â€"but do you know how to take care of a woolen blanket? I don't know about you, but I have several woolen blankets in my house that I only use for anything - keep me cozy while watching TV, wrapping my back from the fire for picnics and outdoor concertsâ€¦ | The list goes on. The wonderful thing about wool blankets is their versatility, and the fact that they can last forever. That last point, of course, depends on how well you care about your wool blankets. So â€"How do you care about a woolen blanket? How do you wash it? How do you store it? Is there a way to spot the stains? How do you dry without shrinking? What if he was very old, very dirty, or damaged somehow? Don't be afraid. Taking care of wool blankets seems intimidating, but it is actually quite easy. It was purchased in Ireland during the holidays of a friend. The quality of the yarn and the model is beautiful. It is a gift I often use, but with so much use, you had recently heard - and smelled! â€"Nothing fresh, we should say. Over the years, this blanket has been in intense use during cold winters, since I or another member of the family frown under it while watching TV, reading or nap. Occasionally the family member was one of our dogs (and we had some sheds!). Since we've moved so many times over the years, this blanket has also seen its share of storage in cardboard boxes, sometimes for months at a time. Due to the age of the blanket â€"and the age of some of the stains â€" I was more than a bit nervous to throw it in the washing machine, or even wash it by hand. With a small search, however, I was able to restore it to as new conditions with a small effort. How to wash a blanket in wool Before starting the cleaning process, check out any tags to see if the blanket is labeled only dry. If so, you should take it to a respectable dry cleaner. If so â€"Here you are! Outside of payment for this (and remembering to take it), your job is finished! If there is no label, or if you just want to save a couple of dollars, washing the blanket at home is the way to go. Material: Step 1: Examine the blanket first for the Tears, discussions depoking, or other repairs. Take care of these repairs before washing the blanket while the washing process could get worse. Step 2: Pilling can be a problem for wool products, then exceeds the entire blanket with a Comb or instrument. Try to keep your hairstyle in the same direction every time so that the weaving of the blanket remains consistent. Step 3: On a sink or a bathtub, slowly pour the soda club on any stain until the fabric is saturated. At the beginning the wool will reject the liquid, but soon the immerse it. Gently rub the fabric to dissolve the stain. Rinse under cold water until the stain disappeared. Repeat if necessary. (I was surprised how quickly the stains were coming out!) Step 4: Place the blanket in the washing machine and leave it in a cold water for 15 minutes. This will help further with the removal of spots, and also help the wool soak in the water before the washing process starts. Step 5: Run the washing machine on the delicate cycle (or wool cycle, if the washing machine has the option). Also in this case, use cold water and delicate soap. Do not use the rotation cycle. Step 6: When the cycle is complete, squeeze the excess water from the blanket, without toring it. Helps wrap a towel or two around the blanket to avoid torting it accidentally. How to dry a wool blanket Step 1: Place the flat blanket over several dry towels. Roll towels and cover together, so that the towels can absorb excess water from the blanket. Unrolled gently. Step 2: hang the blanket to dry. It can still be very wet and dripping, so the ideal layout is to put a clothesline in a bathtub so that the water drops into the drain. The blanket can also be hanging on the outside, but do not hang it in direct sunlight as it can fade and damage the fibers. The wool dries surprisingly quickly ... my blanket has dried overnight, indoors! Do not dry the blanket in the dryer, as it will damage the fibers and reduce the blanket. Step 3: Once the blanket is completely dry, rub the hands slightly over the entire surface to smooth the wrinkles and remove any pieces of loose plush A -could be a good handfull! Your blanket is now soft, fresh and ready to pamper yourself under yet! How to keep a wool blanket When you don't use the blanket, it is better to keep it in a clean, dark and humidity-free place. If you prefer, you can also put it within a plastic bag or a hermetically sealed plastic bin to avoid damage to the pests the cedar wood blocks will also keep the parasites away. During periods of use, make sure to bend the blanket and position it to a point where it will not be sitting or otherwise crushed. I like to throw my behind the living room chairs. Image from Pixabay Before going ahead and explain how to wash a wool blanket, you need to understand how wool differs from other fibers. You are probably well aware that the wool comes from sheep. But you may not realize that unlike synthetic and vegetable base fibers, animal hair is made of protein. This is a big problem if you wash everything in the washing machine. See: Most laundry detergents contain not only soap but also enzymes, organic molecules that crush other biological molecules. For example, the Amiliani break down the starch, while the lipases break down the grease. Then we have proteases, breaking down protein. Since wool is a delicate fiber, it requires accurate management. So unless your blanket doesn't smell or be remarkably dirty, we advise you to clean it. Since the wool is very dense, once set in stains, they're almost impossible to get rid of. To remove a new stain, try to use seltz water. The gaseous bubbles want trap and lift the stain easily. If you donate t have seltzer water at hand or if the stain is older, make a cleaning solution by mixing a part of distilled vinegar with two parts of water. Bath the spotted area with the solution and then wipe everything with a clean cloth. Whatever you do, donate t attempt to remove the stain with washing it. That not only weaken the fibers, but could also spread the stain to other parts of the blanket. If the ISNA t vinegar solution strong enough to remove the exit, try to use cold water mixed with a delicate detergent instead. To prevent bleeding of color, do a test place to confirm that the blanket is colorfast before you spot clean it. Dip a clean, white cloth in the cleansing solution and swab a small area of your shot. If the fabric absorbs the dye from the blanket, bring it to a dry laundry. If the woollen shot is still dirty after a spot-clean, soak in cold water help could. Fill your sink or bathtub with cold water and add a drop of mild detergent and safety wool. If the water is too much soapy, you're out of the edge. Too much soap will eliminate the fibers out of their natural oils, and the Wona blanket will be resistant to dirt. Because wool fibers are very fragile when they're wet, resist the temptation of stain or shake the blanket. Instead, leave the Fora soaking for a few minutes. While most wool items are too delicate to be thrown into the washing machine, many wool blankets are a mixture of wool and another fiber. Therefore, you can usually wash a wool blanket on a delicate cycle. However, the Dona t take the word for it. Check the treatment label first. Bring the blanket to a professional if the label of care, says, â Dry Clean Only.â If the care label doesn't warn you against the dangers of washing machine, put the blanket inside the washing machine, and add only a drop of delicate detergent designed for wool garments. Set the washing machine for a delicate cycle or wool and make it work for two minutes before cancelling it. Then, switch to the rinse cycle. If wool is scratching, consider adding two cups of vinegaror more drops of liquid plant glycerin (found in the cooking aisle of most shops or in pharmacies). Let the rinse cycle to complete. Never wash more than one wool blanket at a time. If you do, you sand against each other, it is causing pilling. If you notice that your blanket is dirty during a camping trip in the middle of winter, you don't have to wait until you get there to clean it. The only warning? You need to have access to fresh falling snow and a broom. Ideally, you want snow to be dry and dusty. Wet and heavy snow will emulate your wool blanket. Start by shaking the blanket, releasing any loose dirt or dust particles that could be attached to it. Then let it acclimate at the temperature by hanging it outside for at least half an hour. Then, find a clean area of snow (make sure it isn't yellow) and place us on your woollen shot. Cover the whole blanket with snow and then beat with the flat side of the broom. Leave the snow blanket alone for about 20 minutes before flipping over and repeating the technique on the other side. Shake the blanket once again to get rid of all the excess snow and hang over a clothesline or a railing for about 30 minutes. A The small amount of ammonia in the snow should react with cold air, causing all dirt to harden and fall from your wool blanket. The snow will eventually turn into steam, leaving the blanket clean and clean (and dry)! How to Dry a Wool Cover It is IMPORTANT to know how to wash a wool blanket is not enough. You also need to understand how to dry properly. Do not tear the blanket after washing it as this can ruin its shape or create permanent wrinkles. Instead, roll the wet blanket into a towel to absorb moisture. Next, hang the blanket to dry the air. However, be careful to avoid direct sunlight. The sun can destroy the softness of the blanket and make it disappear. If the weather is not beautiful or you do not have access to the garden or balcony, you can hang the wet blanket over a door, a clothes rack or an anti-rust shower curtain. Alternatively, lay it on some clean towels on the floor. image by pexels Avoid the dryer unless the care label says the dryer is fine. Dry the blanket in a dryer most likely crush the fibers, narrowing the material. If, for some reason, you have to put the blanket in the dryer, invest in wool dryer balls (available at most outlets and cleaning supplies) to reduce drying times and minimize statics. Brush the wool blanket with a fabric brush (or a towel) if the wool blanket feels stiff after drying it. Now you know how to get a BLANKET from LANA! Wool slabs are expensive. But if you take care of your wool blanket, it will last for years. Taking care of a wool blanket is not so difficult. The most important thing to remember is to avoid washing it uselessly.
