How to make a dcfs report in illinois

Whether this is your first smartphone or just your first using Android, there's a lot to love here, and it all starts with finding some apps to fill that new phone (or tablet) with. Google Play is the app store that Google runs, and it's also an important piece of Android's security as it scans apps before and after they're downloaded and monitors them for unusual activity. It can be a bit overwhelming when you first open up Google Play, but don't worry, we're here to help you get started! If you already know the name of the app you're looking for, or have a specific app type in mind, you can search for it rather than browsing through app categories. Tap the Google Play icon on your home screen. Tap the white search bar at the top of the screen. Enter the name of the app (or type of app) you're looking for. Tap the search icon on your keyboard (should be in the location of the Enter key). If you're not quite as sure what you want, or your search results don't help you (don't worry, it happens to all of us), there are other ways to find apps on Google Play. How to browse apps in Google Play You can browse through Google Play's Top Charts to try and find a new app you want to install. Tap the Google Play icon on your home screen. Tap Top Charts underneath the Home tab. You're now ready to browse the charts for new apps. Swipe left and right between the charts for Top Free, Top Paid, Top Grossing, Top New Free, Top New Paid, and Trending. You can also browse through Google Play by category: Tap the Google Play icon on your home screen. Tap Categories underneath the Home/Games tabs. Tap the category you'd like to browse. Now, some app categories are just a series of Top Charts narrowed to that category of app, but other categories have featured apps and subcategories in addition to the Top Charts for that category. Once you've found one you like, it's time to install it. How to download free apps Tap on an app in the search results or categories. Tap Read more and look through the app's description and reviews to ensure the app seems right for you. Tap Install. The app will now download and install itself, usually in a few seconds depending on how large or small the app is. If you're on a device running an older version of Android, you'll have to agree to an app's permissions before it downloads. Read the permissions before clicking Agree. Once the app is finished installing, an Open button will appear in the same place the Install button previously occupied. How to buy paid apps The process for buying a paid app is just a hair different than downloading a free one, and it goes like this: Tap on an app you'd like to buy. Tap the price to bring up the payment options. Your default payment method will be shown. If you want to change your payment method, tap the down arrow next to your current payment method. Tap Payment methods. Tap one of your established payment methods. If you don't have one, you'll be prompted to add a credit card, PayPal account, or carrier billing. Tap Buy. Confirm your Google Play password or use your fingerprint to confirm your purchase. The payment is processed and the download will begin. Tap Continue to close the window. Apps need updates from time to time, and if you need to manually update your apps, here's how you do it. Swipe in from the left edge of the screen OR tap the three line menu icon in the top white bar to open the menu. Tap My apps & games. App needing updates will appear at the top of the list. To update a single app, tap the Update box next to the app. Tap Update All to update all the apps needing updates. Rather than manually updating apps, which is easy to forget, Google Play is set to automatically update apps for you when you're on Wi-Fi. If you'd prefer that it install updates automatically even when on cellular data — or not auto-update at all — you can change the setting easily. Swipe in from the left edge of the screen OR tap the three line menu icon in the top white bar to open the menu. Scroll down and tap Settings. Tap Auto-update apps. To turn off auto-update, select Do no auto-update apps. To enable auto-update on cellular data, select Auto-update at any time. If there are individual apps you do not want auto-updated, you can opt them out of auto-update while allowing your other apps to stay updated. Tap the app you don't want auto-updating. Tap the three dot menu icon in the top right corner of the screen (next to the search icon). Tap to uncheck Enable auto-update. How to uninstall apps Tap the app you want to uninstall. Tap Uninstall. For some paid apps within the refund window, this box might read Refund instead. A window will open confirming you want to uninstall the app. Tap OK. The app will now uninstall and remove itself from the device. How to remove apps from your app library If you install an app, don't like it, and uninstall it, it's still attached to your app history in the Library section of My apps & games. If you don't want an app in that list anymore, here's how you get rid of it. Tap the X to the right of the Install button on the app you want to remove from your library. A window will pop up asking you to confirm that you wish to remove this from your library. Tap OK. Your turn! What do you love about the Google Play Store? Find any good apps lately? Some of the apps and games are free to download, while others cost a small fee. To download an app or game from the Google Play store on a computer, follow the steps below. Note On a computer, Google Play is only accessible using an Internet browser. You cannot download Google Play to a computer. Access the Google Play store. On the left side of the Play store homepage, click the Apps option. In the navigation bar near the top of the Apps page, click the Categories drop-down list. Select the type or genre of app or game you want to find. The page shows a refined list of apps or games, based on the type or genre you selected. Find the app or game you want to download and click the icon or its name. Tip You can also search for an app or game using the Search text box at the top of the page. If the app or game is compatible with your device, you see a message stating This app is available for your device below the name of the app or game. Click the green Install button to install it. If it's not compatible, you see a message stating This app is not available for your device. To install and run an incompatible app or game, you need to use an emulator, such as Bluestacks. After installing an emulator, you can try to access the app or game page again and click the green Install button. Download from Google Play on a smartphone or tablet To download an app or game from the Google Play store on a smartphone or tablet, follow the steps below. Tip If you're using an Android smartphone or tablet, you can utilize the Google Play app to find and download apps and games using the steps in the Chromebook section. Tip iPhone and iPad users can download the Google Play app from the Apple App store, then follow the steps in the Chromebook section. Using the Chrome browser on your smartphone or tablet, access the Google Play store at . Near the top-left of the Google Play page, tap the icon, and tap the Apps option. Scroll down the page to view various categories of apps and games, or click Show More at the bottom of the page to view more categories. And it's not only cool for you, but your feedback also helps the developers fine tune the experience on multiple devices and under varying sets of circumstances. Google gets this, so it actually has a special section of the Play Store just for early release software. RELATED: How to Install Apps Not Found in the Play Store on Your Android Device This "Early Access" arena is exactly what it sounds like: a place for developers to upload nearly-finished-but-not-complete apps and games for people to try out. These apps and games are stable enough for you to install and play around with, but they may have certain quirks or errors that can potentially hinder the experience. Like I said, the idea is to let you get an idea of what to expect, as well as help the developer work out any kinks as they arise. It's a win-win. Accessing this section of the Play Store is actually really simple. First, open the Play Store. You'll find it in the app drawer and basically any and every Android device. Assuming you haven't opened it in a while, it should start on the Apps & Games page. If not, open the menu by sliding in from the left side of the screen and select "Apps & games." On the main Apps & Games page, there are advertisements for new or other highlight-worthy apps, with a carousel or keywords and categories just below. Cycle through these keywords by swiping and eventually you'll see one labeled "Early Access." Tap that little guy. Like magic, you'll be swept away to a land of Early Access software—not quite beta, but not quite stable. Welcome to the in-between stage of software. Get giddy. This section is broken down into two simple sections: "Unreleased Apps" and "Games in Development." A handful of each will be displayed beneath each subheading, with the option to view the full catalog by tapping the "More" link beside the respective listing. Google curates this section pretty heavily from what I can tell, so don't expect a massive catalog to choose from. Instead, you'll be looking at 15-20 different apps or games to take a closer look at, which is nice. From here, the app or game will install like any other—just tap on the one you'd like to check out, then hit the "Install" button. The main difference that you'll see here is the disclaimer just below said button, letting you know that the app is still in development and be unstable. Otherwise, the app will install and update just like any other app from the Play Store. Keep it simple, you know? It's worth keeping in mind that this is entirely different than Google's software beta program, which allows developers to upload beta versions of existing apps, keeping them on a separate channel from the stable version but still under the same Play Store listing. Users are then able to sign up for beta access, at which point their stable app will be updated to the beta channel. Source: iMore Getting your first iPhone or iPad is just the beginning. How to automatically download apps and games you buy on one device onto others If you own more than one Apple device, like an iPhone and an iPad, or an iPad and an iPod touch, or all three, you can automatically download apps and games onto all of them if they are all under the same Apple ID. Well, you can't download iPad-only apps onto an iPhone or iPod touch, but that is the only restriction. Open the Settings app. Scroll down and tap on App Store. Under Automatic Downloads, tap Apps to toggle the switch on. Source: iMore You can also turn on automatic downloads for music, iBooks, and audiobooks the same way. How to disable app updates over cellular If you have concerns about using up too much of your cellular data, it is a very good idea to disable downloading updates over cellular, especially if you have automatic updates turned on.
