In Texas, registered medical/surgical nurses typically earn \$54,730 per year, with overtime pay adding up to an extra \$13,343 annually. The highest-paid nursing jobs in the US average around \$113,000, but salaries vary depending on the position, requiring a college degree or offering unique working conditions and benefits.
