The Union of European Football Associations (UEFA) is a governing body for football, futsal, and beach football in Europe. It also governs football in countries that are part of the transcontinental region, including Turkey, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Cyprus, Armenia, and Israel. UEFA has 55 national association members and is one of six continental bodies of governance in association football. The organization runs various national and club competitions, including the European Championship, Nations League, Champions League, Europa League, Conference League, and Super Cup. The current president of UEFA is Aleksander Čeferin, who was elected at the 12th Extraordinary UEFA Congress in Athens in September 2016. UEFA's headquarters are located in Nyon, Switzerland, and the organization has grown from 25 founding members to over 50 members by the mid-1990s. UEFA membership coincides with recognition as a sovereign country in Europe, although there are some exceptions. The organization has previously declined membership to non-sovereign countries like Jersey. UEFA's main competitors include FIFA, which is also responsible for international football competitions. The International Olympic Committee (IOC) has recommended that the Union of European Football Associations (UEFA) suspend Russia from participating in its competitions. As a result, UEFA has banned Russian teams, including the national team and underage teams, from competing in their tournaments. However, the ban was lifted for the Russia U-17 team, allowing them to participate in the 2024 Euro U-17 tournament with UEFA's statement that "by banning children from our competitions, we not only fail to recognize and uphold a fundamental right for their holistic development but we directly discriminate against them". The lifting of the ban also applies to all teams, men and women, of underage players. This decision was met with criticism from some countries, including Ukraine, England, and Sweden, who threatened to boycott matches against Russia. On the other hand, five UEFA national teams - Germany, Italy, France, England, and Spain - have won 12 out of 22 FIFA World Cups for Europe, making them part of the "Europe's Big Five" club. The UEFA executive committee is composed of 20 members, including President Aleksander Čeferin and Vice-President Karl-Erik Nilsson. The committee is responsible for making decisions on various UEFA competitions and calendar issues. UEFA is a leading organization that manages football competitions across Europe and some parts of Asia, offering national teams and professional clubs numerous opportunities to participate in prestigious tournaments. UEFA Soccer Competitions UEFA does not organise any beach soccer competitions. International and club beach soccer competitions for UEFA members are organised externally by Beach Soccer Worldwide. The Italian, German, Spanish, French and Russian men's national teams are the only teams to have won the European football championship in all categories. The top-ranked UEFA competition is the UEFA Champions League. This competition started in 1955 as the European Champion Clubs' Cup. It has been expanded over time to gather the top teams of each country's league. A second, lower-ranked competition is the UEFA Europa League. The UEFA Europa Conference League was created in December 2018 and features 32 teams in eight groups of four. UEFA also conducts the UEFA Women's Champions League for club teams. This competition was first held in 2001. Another competition, the UEFA Super Cup, pits the winners of the Champions League against the winners of the Europa League. The UEFA Intertoto Cup is a summer competition that operated from 1995 to 2008. The UEFA national team competitions saw various teams perform well in different categories, with Spain and France topping the men's rankings as of April 2025. In the women's category, Spain was ranked first with a high score of 2034.34 points, followed by Germany. The top-performing countries in the European men's football rankings were Spain (1854.64 points), France (1852.71 points), and England (1819.2 points). In contrast, Netherlands (1752.44 points) and Portugal (1750.08 points) ranked lower, but still maintained a strong presence in the league. In the women's category, Sweden (1989.21 points) and France (1941.61 points) occupied the top two positions, with England rising to fourth place. Netherlands (1926.68 points), Denmark (1888.68 points), and Italy (1878.37 points) followed closely behind. A closer look at the rankings reveals that countries like Turkey (1551.47 points), Sweden (1536.05 points), and Wales (1535.57 points) performed well, although their positions were slightly lower than expected. Other teams, such as Norway (1497.18 points), Czech Republic (1491.43 points), and Greece (1489.82 points), also showed promising results. However, some countries struggled to find their footing, including Albania (1375.95 points), North Macedonia (1375.58 points), and Finland (1359.79 points). Despite this, all teams contributed to the diverse landscape of UEFA national team competitions. ###ARTICLE2026 FIFA World Cup qualification - Men's The 2026 FIFA World Cup qualification process for the men's tournament began on September 8, 2019, with a total of 211 teams from each confederation eligible to qualify. The tournaments feature national under-20 and under-17 teams from all over the world, with the winner being determined through a knockout format. The first FIFA Under-20 World Cup was held in 1977 in Japan, while the first FIFA Under-17 World Cup was held in 1985 in China. Since then, both tournaments have been held annually, with the number of participating teams increasing over time. The most successful team in the FIFA Under-20 World Cup is Brazil, which has won the tournament six times. The Netherlands and Spain have each won the tournament three times. The FIFA World Cup is an international association football tournament contested by the men's national teams of the members of Fédération Internationale de Football Association (FIFA), the sport's global governing body. The most commonly used names for the tournament are the FIFA World Cup, simply the World Cup, or the Football World Cup. The 2018 FIFA World Cup was the 22nd edition of the tournament, held in Russia from June to July 2018. A total of 32 teams qualified for the tournament by winning their respective confederation's qualification process or through a playoff system. UEFA Sanctions, Scandals, and Stadiums Sanctions have been imposed on various countries due to their involvement in international football events. This includes sanctions against Russia, Belarus, and Albania due to their support for the 2022 Russian invasion of Ukraine. In addition, UEFA has faced criticism for its handling of certain situations, such as the Heysel Stadium disaster in England, which led to suspensions and fines against English association football clubs. Furthermore, UEFA's decision to host the Europa League Cup final in Baku, Azerbaijan, raised concerns about safety and sparked debates about the influence of elite clubs on the game. The partnership between UEFA and blockchain company Chiliz in 2022 was also met with criticism from fan groups across Europe. Israel joined UEFA in 1992 as an associate member after facing political pressure from Arab and Muslim members, allowing Israeli clubs to participate in UEFA club competitions and national teams to compete in championships. Kazakhstan, previously a member of the Asian Football Confederation, also joined UEFA. The Soviet Union's dissolution in 1992 led to the formation of 15 republics, with the Russian Football Union becoming the successor to the Football Federation of the Soviet Union. The Czech Republic and Slovakia formed separate football associations after the dissolution of Czechoslovakia. Yugoslavia's collapse resulted in the creation of new football organizations, including the Football Association of Serbia and Montenegro, which later became the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia. Chelsea qualified for the Europa League's Round of 32 after finishing third in the group stage of the 2012-13 Champions League. FIFA recognizes certain teams as successors to previous national teams, including Germany succeeding West Germany and East Germany, Russia succeeding the USSR, and Serbia succeeding Yugoslavia. Israel competed under different names in past competitions, including Eretz Yisrael in 1934 and 1938. Russia's best result in the World Cup is quarter-finals in 2018, but FIFA considers them as the successor team to the USSR. The Czech Republic and Slovakia are considered successors to Czechoslovakia by FIFA. Various teams have represented Germany in past competitions, including the United Team of Germany in 1964 and the Federal Republic of Germany in 1972, 1984, and 1988. Greece withdrew from the 1964 competition after refusing to play Albania. Kazakhstan previously represented the AFC before joining UEFA in 2000. The 2020 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
