To create a Gmail account, you need to sign up for a Google Account first. This will allow you to access Gmail and other Google services such as YouTube, Google Play, and Google Drive. However, when it's unlocked, you'll see this tab available for sharing content. To share content from private space, first unlock it. Then, use sharing apps to send and receive content over Bluetooth from private space apps. Note that shared content doesn't reveal the existence of private space. Using a different Google Account for private space offers several benefits. It allows you to sign in to your desired accounts without affecting your main space or other devices. However, using a dedicated Google Account for private space can help prevent unexpected data leaks to your main space. Keep in mind that some launcher apps may not support private space, and it bypasses virtual private network (VPN) on the device. Private space offers exclusive features like finding an app's information, pausing or uninstalling an app, but also has limitations such as not being able to add widgets or shortcuts to your home screen.
