How to Order You can order Answer Services during test registration or after your test date. If you don't order with your registration, you can still order in two ways: Note: The Student Answer Verification fee is not refundable once the service has been fulfilled. You can request a refund if you're absent on test day. The verdict is in and the critics agree: yes, students should use the "Question and Answer" service (QAS) provided by the College Board! This service is available to students when they register to take their test, or up to five months after their test date. By engaging valuable resources like this, students will add a significant tool to their ACT and SAT test taking toolkit. During (or after) test registration students elect to pay the (small) fee (about \$20) to receive the following materials after their test is scored: Their original test Their answers The official answer key, with level of difficulty ratings and Scoring information If the QAS service is not available on a specific testing date, they can choose the Student Answer Service (SAS) report, which contains information about the type of questions, level of difficulty and whether students' answers were correct, incorrect or omitted. This is valuable and comparable to the QAS, and costs a few dollars less. The SAT "Question and Answer" service will also include the essay section as well, with the question/prompt and the scoring matrix. This "behind the scenes" look at the test helps students understand how they answer questions, as well as the correct answers themselves. Studying these material helps strengthen their test taking muscles and allows students to learn from their mistakes. Helping students (and teachers) understand test taking tendencies, capabilities and habits will help with re-testing too. Does the student trust their instincts when answering? Do they constantly doubt themselves? What throws them off? How do they answer essay questions? And how are those essays graded? All of these questions (and more) can be answered when exploring this post-testing data with students. Because the level of difficulty of each question is included, students can also begin to understand how they answer different types of questions. We are human beings with unique characteristics, which are even reflected in our test taking capabilities. If students are doubters, they will likely ignore their instincts and choose the wrong answer. If they tend to zone out, they will likely run out of time and start making quick and hasty (and usually incorrect) answer choices. When students choose the QAS they can study the questions and review their specific answer choices. Studying their own test material will help students (teachers and tutors) identify areas that need improvement and potential test taking habits. Seeing where habitual mistakes (or successes) occur can help inform new study and test taking techniques. ACT and SAT tutors will find this information invaluable in their test prep work. Using every tool available helps students improve ACT and SAT test scores. Registering for the "Question and Answer" service is a logical and valuable tool for students. Remember that materials can take up to 6 weeks to arrive after the test. Remind students to plan their next testing date with that in mind. Allow enough time to receive the materials and to study accordingly. Section 3 of the math section does not allow use of calculator, whereas the calculator is permitted in Section 4 of the math section. [My daughter] got her SAT scores back. September 2020 The SAT is always given bright and early on "SAT"urday mornings. The registration deadline is usually four weeks prior to the test date. Late registration is usually cut off about 10 days prior to the test date. Late registration comes at an additional expense. What Both QAS and SAS Include With either the Question-and-Answer Service (QAS) or the Student Answer Service (SAS), you can expect to receive a report that provides you details on the number of questions you answered correctly, incorrectly, or omitted on the SAT, as well as information on the different types of questions. Students are able to order student answer verification services at the time when they are registering for the SAT or up to five months after their SAT test date has passed. Depending on what test date they select and what test location they visit to take the SAT, they have the possibility of ordering either the Question-and-Answer Service or the Student Answer Service. Question-and-Answer Service (QAS) The Question-and-Answer Service is an excellent resource for students who have taken the SAT, and it's the better of the two available score verification options. What makes the Question-and-Answer Service so attractive and useful? It allows students who have taken the SAT to look over their actual test booklet! That's incredible. Order Student Answer Service if Question-and-Answer Service is unavailable. If you're taking the SAT in October, March, or May, it's extremely wise for you to order the Question-and-Answer service. Doing so can provide you (and your SAT prep tutor) an invaluable resource toward understanding what went wrong and what went right on the day of the test. By analyzing your missed questions inside and out, you'll be going a long way toward ensuring you don't repeat similar mistakes the next time you take the SAT. Student Answer Services (SAS) Student Answer Services is the less desirable of the two score verification options offered by the College Board to students who have taken the SAT, but it can still be a useful resource for understanding your performance on the test. The Student Answer Services report is a computer-generated document that contains information on the number of questions you missed on the SAT and what type of questions they are. You do NOT get to review the actual content of the questions you missed, however. Still, it can be a valuable resource. Perhaps you're missing a lot of questions in the category labeled Expression of Ideas, or maybe you struggle with Command of Evidence. You'll know if you order the SAS report. Do you start strong but then miss a string of questions toward the end of the Calculator Math section? You'll know after a quick glance at the SAS report. Was the second-to-last reading passage the toughest one for you? The SAS report will offer you that insight. Remember, if the QAS service is available, it contains more information... but if it's not, order the SAS service and bring it in to your tutor for review. Together, we'll be able to come up with an SAT prep plan designed to address your specific weaknesses.
