The JAV ANiHitoe was composed of a number of kimono-like robes, layered on top of each other, with the outer robes cut both larger and thinner to reveal the garments in layers below. These robes were referred to as Hutoe, with the closest robe - worn as underwear against the skin - known as kosodo. Hakama were also worn as underwear with kosodo. Over time, the two would gradually become the closeups, with kosodo eventually developing into modern kimono. Despite its name, the JAV ANiHitoe varied in its exact number of layers. [1] Unlike Obi (Belt), although unlike modern Obi, this was little more than a thin and friendly fabric. The number of layers and the type of layers, could alter the formality of a nihitoe outfit, with some accessories, such as boxes and a long skirt train (known as the Mo) worn only for special, formal formal The clothes of the court of Heian-period paid particular attention to the symbolism of color, with chromatic combinations on layers of women's clothes known as kasane no irome. [2] These combinations of colors, reported by names that reflected their corresponding season of wear, did not faithfully reproduce the exact colors of nature, but were instead intended to reproduce a sensation of season. In the previous styles of j-133; 171; nihitoe, more layers have been worn, the total weight of which could be as total as 20 kilograms (44th and 160lb). Because of this weight, movement could be difficult. Heian ladies commonly sleep in the deepest layers of their j133s; 171; nihitoe, hakama and kosode, using them as pyjamas. Layers may be: Or maintained, depending on the season and night temperatures. For the Muromachi period, however, the number of layers of the dress was greatly reduced. The kosode: a short dress of red or white silk of ankle or of lower length of calf. Nagabakama: the formal version of hakama worn by noble women; a very long red skirt, sewn with two separate legs. The hitoe: a silk robe, usually red, white or blue-green, although other colors (such as dark-violet red or dark green) rarely occur. The itsuttsuginu: a series of light-colored tunics or ears, usually five or sometimes six in number, creating the appearance of layers of jade. Many more layers of earrings were worn during the Heian period until the government passed sumptuous laws reducing the number of layers worn. A scarlet silk robe worn as a regenerator and support for the outer garments. Note: a decorated silk dress and model, typically with interlaced decoration, both shorter and narrower than the uchiginu. The colour and fabric used for indicate the degree of wearer. Karaginu: a lifelong Chinese-style jacket. The mo: a train skirt similar to the apron, worn behind the robe. White with painted or embroidered decoration. A mo (train) in a Portrait of Sei Shonagon On less formal occasions, kouchichi (lit., "small cloak", a brocade bathrobe more short) were worn over the uchichi or uwagi, intended to raise the formality of a dress on occasions when karagin and mo were not worn. [8][9] However, karagino and mo were necessary for the j197 to function; 171 nihitoe were considered formal clothing. [10] Colors and layered colors The colors and their layouts had a particular significance for the j133; nihitoe. The only place where the layers were really distinguishable was around the sleeves, the ends the garment and neck, although in summer, the pure fabrics were worn to create new color effects across the layers. During the Heian period, a woman sat hidden behind a suhare screen with the only lower body and sleeve edges visible to a stranger. Therefore, the layers of colors were used to represent the woman herself, and the arrangements of the layers and their colors were a good indication for an outsider who tastes and ranks the lady. The color combinations called kasane no irome (A 165; A±ÁÁÁ@Á ÖÁÁ®, "layers of color".[17] poetic names have been given in reference to the flora and fauna of the season, such as "plum cremson of the spring", although they have not necessarily reproduced exactly these colors; a set called "under the snow" had a layer of green depicting leaves, layers of rose, with white on top to represent the snow. Color combinations have changed with seasons and occasions, with the fashion of changing clothes just before the turn of the season. The proper use of these colors, and the point at which one changed its tunic, gave an indication of the cultured and refined taste [11] Apart from their dresses, even the Japanese court ladies of the Heian era wore their hair very long, cut only on the sides of their faces in a stratified way, with their hair sometimes longer sometimes bound bound This hairstyle has been known as suberakashi © "It was sometimes worn with an ornament on its forehead. Accessories An important accessory worn with the j133;nihitoe was an elaborate fan, known as a hig, made of cypress wood lists, commonly painted and tied together with long silk cords. This has been used by women not only to cool, but also as an important communication device; Poiche. © The women of Heian's court were not allowed to speak face to face with strangers, a woman could hold her sleeve up or use her fan open to protect herself from prying eyes. Communication with potential suitors was generally conducted with women sitting behind a blind sweat, with the suitor only able to see the sleeves and therefore the layers of his j133s; 171; nihito. This practice was prominent during the Heian period, and was described in the story of Genji. During the marriage of Empress Masako to the Crown Prince, the Empress wore nyhite for the official ceremony. Although both the Empress and her queens-in-waiting all wore the j133s; 171; nihitoe, the style worn was a form of Edo period, not Heian style.
